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Between May 23rd and June 19th, 2022, local residents, business owners, and visitors to Weymouth were invited to respond to an online survey, launched with aim to unpack the qualities which make Weymouth seafront special and hopes for the future of the seafront offer.

The survey received 2224 submissions, with respondents taking on average, 14:45 minutes to complete. This document is an analysis of the 2224 survey responses. The data will be used to help inform and support the masterplan.



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Demographic

68% of respondents are residents of Weymouth. A further 12% live elsewhere in Dorset.




Travel

50% of local respondents usually travel to the seafront on foot, whilst just over a third drive and park.

70% of respondents living outside of Weymouth usually travel to the seafront via car and park.

Preferred car parks include the Pavilion and Swannery.


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


Visits -Weymouth Residents

70% of Weymouth residents visit the seafront 'several times a week' or 'everyday'. Nearly 95% visit at least 'several times per month'

Results highlight that the seafront is utilised by a wide range of users at various times, and that at least 30% of local respondents visit the seafront in groups of 3 or more.







All age groups say they visit the seafront at lots of different times, demonstrating the importance of the beach/seafront to the entire community.


Predictably, over 65s are more likely to visit during the day on a weekday than at any other time.





Visiting Weymouth and length of stay









Residents under the age of 34 and those visiting with family are likely to spend longer periods of time on the seafront.







Those visiting with family, particularly young children, are likely to spend longer periods of time on the seafront.







Over 70% of visitors will visit the harbour or town centre when visiting the seafront. 52% visit both the town centre and harbour when visiting the seafront.

A little over a third of respondents will combine a trip to the seaside with a visit to Nothe Fort and/or parks and gardens.

20% of respondents will visit the seafront, town centre, harbour, Nothe Fort, and parks/gardens during a trip to Weymouth.







Survey analysis indicates that on average residents that drive and park spend approx. £10 when visiting the seafront, whilst those that walk or cycle spend approx. £7.50 *

Whilst residents that cycle or walk to the seafront spend less on average than those that drive and park, they are likely to visit more often. (see previous page)






Less than 30% of residents spend more than £10 whilst visiting the seafront. In contrast 66% of non-residents spend over £10 when visiting





Perception - Under 25's

Question: Which areas of the seafront (between Weymouth Pavilion Theatre in the south, and Overcombe Beach in the north) do you like to use/ visit, and what do you usually do here?

Responses from under 25s:

"Greenhill beach in the summer, as there are less tourists there"

"Cinema and pavilion to watch shows and films"

"I usually got to the south end for drinks on the sea front or to go to the beach at all parts with friends and family"

"Overcombe beach, sit with friends and swimming in the sea"

> "I cycle along the prom from Preston into town. I also walk a lot from oasis to the front skate park"

"I normally sit on the seafront between the Pavilion and Beach Office and eat my lunch"

"Normally stick to the area between the Pavilion and Kings Statue. Most commonly for rides when they're up and recently the Jubilee fireworks. Sometime if bored of the rides or they're not up we can just walk laps of the beach/promenade or sit in alley gardens nearby."

"I will get a coffee and walk along to the clock or visit the bars on the seafront"

"We roller skate along the esplanade"

"Greenhill beach (the stone covered area) I usually chill and then go in the sea"

"I normally park at Brunswick Terrace and go paddle boarding."

"See few shops, go on the beach if the rides are up at the pavilion go on them or even go to the amusements"


"Walk the dogs in the south, then as it gets warmer closer to north for sunbathing as less people go here"

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Perception - Residents

Question: Which areas of the seafront (between Weymouth Pavilion Theatre in the south, and Overcombe Beach in the north) do you like to use/ visit, and what do you usually do here?

Responses from Weymouth residents:

"Mainly Pavilion end, playing with grandchildren, taking exercise, taking refreshment"

"Ice cream from Baboo, we scoot or cycle along to Overcombe Corner and usually get a coffee at Top Cat. We have 2 small children and will use the small paddling pool if it's open"

"Overcombe just sit and enjoy the quiet"

> "All areas. Love the Esplanade and the floral beds"

"Too much to share. Grandchild on beach. Swimming. Theatre. Shopping. Tea on the beach. Just sitting and enjoying the view."

"We walk to Overcombe cafe for food or drink, often picnic on the beach. Take our grandson to the beach when he visits. We walk into town for shopping, cinema, food, drinks. We like to sit round the harbour and Brewers Quay area for a beer or just the views. We do travel in for the entertainment like Fayre in the Square, Seafood festival and Quayside bands. We also walk to the pavilion for shows."

"All areas of seafront love walking, meeting friends, enjoying the view of the sea and beach"

"I run the entire promenade regularly, fish from piers, build sand castles with my family and swim the full length, I also commute by bike on the promenade"

"I chill with a cup of tea in Alexandra Gardens. I attend Weymouth bike nights on a Thursday as an exhibitor and sometimes spectator. We like to walk the esplanade for exercise."

"From Oasis up to sea palace. Get coffee, read a book, spend time with friends, watch horses in the sea if I'm lucky enough to see any."

"I enjoy the Greenhill area because it is beautiful and less chaotic"

"Usually Greenhill area to play on the beach and go in the sea, although I do use the whole seafront at different times. They all have their own charms!"

"From Alexandra Gardens to lifeguard centre, have a cup of tea and sit and

"The area from Victoria Gardens to the clock. I walk, paddle, and my daughter goes on the rides."

"Seafront enjoying the view."

"Pavilion theatre to watch shows, the beach to open water swim, the beach for Weymouth surf lifesaving club, nook cocktail bar, Alexandra gardens for sitting in, Andys coffee in the blue hut on the beach, cycling along the prom, Greenhill gardens for coffee and relaxing, Rossi's ice cream, Overcombe corner for swimming"



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Perception - Non Residents

Question: Which areas of the seafront (between Weymouth Pavilion Theatre in the south, and Overcombe Beach in the north) do you like to use/ visit, and what do you usually do here?

Responses from visitors:

"Days on the beach at the Pavilion end, walks along the seafront as far as the sea life centre. Entertaining the kids at Alexandra gardens."

"Beach to play on the sand and go on the donkeys sometimes. View the sand sculpture area"

"I like to walk my dog right along the waters edge when allowed all year and also relax in a deck chair"

The beach, the Esplanade, the nightclubs. Usually walk along esplanade, sometimes sit and look at sea. Drink and dance late in nightclubs

> "Near the Pavilion because the kids love crabbing"

The Pavilion end because you can walk your dogs there

> "Visit Pavilion for dancing see shows sir on the wall and people watch stop for coffee or lunch visit Greenhill gardens"

"We use the middle of the beach as this is where refreshments, toilets are. This is handy due to mom being disabled, she can't walk far."

"Sit on the beach. Have Rossi's Ice Cream and coffee. Walk the length of the Esplanade. Have lunch in a cafe. Admire the displays in Greenhill Gardens."

"Walking from Greenhill beach to Oasis cafe, sitting on Greenhill beach and above Jurassic Rocks cafe, Walking from Greenhill into town"

"Between Greenhill Gardens (coffee by tennis courts / lunch in Greenhill Gardens); the beach between Pier and Pavilion (walking, paddling, more coffee); Pavilion area (musing over the harbour)."

"Paddle along the shoreline between the King's Statue and Greenhill Gardens. Buy a Rossi's ice cream and sit on stone bench by clock tower overlooking the sea. Enjoy sea views and gardens at Greenhill. Have coffee at Hamilton's or Oasis cafe. Chat to locals and visitors."

"We like to walk along the seafront, spending time on the beach, often walking to the harbour too. We'll usually get a coffee or ice cream and end the day with fish and chips. Sometimes we go into the town for some shopping but it's never the reason why we visit the town."

"I love the pebbly beach and the walk from pavilion right down to overcome stopping at Greenhill Gardens."

"A wander along the prom, watching the kids and dogs playing on the beach. An ice cream or cup of coffee. Or a visit to the gardens and floral clock."

"We use the full length of the beach from Bowlease to the Pavilion for running and roller blading"

"The kids like the arcades and the fair which cost a bomb. We go on the beach usually by the View so we are nearer the toilets but since volleyball nets installed we have been going near them as my teen enjoys playing. We also go to Greenhill for paddle-boarding or if the beach is very busy. We like walking back along the promenade. We enjoy a drink at the boat all year round."

Favourite places amongst respondents include Weymouth's public green and open spaces such as the beaches, parks, gardens and nature reserves, heritage assets including Nothe Fort and Harbour, cafés, restaurants, and independent shops.

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
Future of Weymouth Seafront



Future

Survey respondents were asked what they feel Weymouth seafront needs to make it a better place to visit, and spend more time on.

Priorities are for more greenery, landscaped spaces that promote biodiversity, physical activity and wellbeing, provision of spaces to hold public events and festivities, more public furniture and improved seafront cycle routes.



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
Future

Provision of spaces that allow/ encourage social activity is of higher priority for U25s.

Landscaping/infrastructure that promotes physical activity, wellness and biodiversity is considered of higher priority amongst Weymouth residents.

60% of respondents visiting with family including children would like for the seafront to offer more child friendly spaces such as play areas and splash parks. This number increases to 70% amongst those with young children.

25% of visitors would like more seafront parking. Residents consider there to be more need for increased cycle parking on the seafront than car parking.

"Better wheelchair access, there is space between the matting and ramps so not all wheelchairs can use it. Wheelchair lockers on the promenade so those who cannot use their chairs on the beach have somewhere safe to store them, the beach wheelchairs only work if you have a carer to push them for you, what about those who have no carer?

Clearer signage showing that assistance dogs are allowed on all of the beach, allow the dogs access to all of the beach all year round" "An eco-friendly seawater lido for serious swimmers! Outdoor showers. Toilets and changing facilities (especially for swimmers in winter at Overcombe). Drinking fountains. An open-air cinema. Stages for musicians and performers. Creative seating options."

"Fresh water showers at every main access/egress to the beach."

"More pedestrianised areas with cafés with outdoor seating"

"Return of Fairy lights"

"Safe BBQ areas"

"Regular arts and crafts and farmers markets along the seafront." "More protection to stop sand blowing onto promenade"

"More trees. Weymouth seafront desperately needs avenues of trees promoting well being shade clean air and happiness and beauty"

"The sand to stop being pushed all the way up to the seafront. There is so much sand being blown around all over the town which never happened when I was younger and there was an actual drop from the prom to the beach."

"The town stretch of the seafront requires de-cluttering of various signs, lights etc. proposals should respect the historic environment. It doesn't need lots of kiosks and buildings, it should be kept free of structures and the focus should be on the public space and making this as attractive as possible."



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Future

When asked 'What would you do' to revitalise Weymouth's economy and increase tourism, we had over 2000 responses.

Common Themes:

- More events
- Less Cars
- More public seating
- More greenery/planting and shaded areas
- More public toilets and shower facilities
- Reduce anti-social behaviour
- Improve seafront cycle routes
- Improved wayfinding/informational signage
- De-clutter promenade
- Introduction of tidal pool / natural lido
- Improved pedestrian routes across the Esplanade

"Provide space which encourages people of all ages to spend time rather than money. Activities, community, freedom, and inclusion. Provide spaces and activities where 16yr-olds are welcomed and parents can play with their children surrounded by art and music, culture, and theatre - this would hugely boost local mental health, opportunities, cultural economy and by this impact, financial economy. Provide a dedicated (but also flexible, if needed) bike lane."

"Outdoor sea 'lido' that captures the tide for swimming." "A mix of seasonal activities, event spaces, hospitality, and active travel solutions. Areas such as the fair etc. look so unloved in the autumn/winter. Outdoor theatre spaces, children's play spaces, igloo style outdoor seating for restaurants. Sheltered green spaces with seating."

"Ensure the historic infrastructure and features are maintained but contrast with some tasteful modern additions. High end hotel. Retain the planting in the beds on the esplanade especially the palm trees and the beautiful planting in Greenhill Gardens. Stop cluttering up the esplanade with tacky funfair's and instead arrange a variety of events and/or activities catering for a range of age groups."


"One area I would look at is along the sea wall road from Overcombe maybe planting trees or some vegetation along the top edge to try and dull road noise and potential pollution from cars going along Preston Beach Road. Lovely to walk along the prom here or sit towards town, or sit on benches, but spoiled by constant road noise. Also, some more cafés along here towards Greenhill."

"More eating and drinking spaces between overcome and the Sealife and make it prettier to encourage people to walk. Maybe some areas for children in that stretch. Keep cycles off the prom and build better cycling. Improve area before Gardens where the beach huts and cafés look very shabby."

"Reduce car journeys along seafront. Pedestrianise King Street so that access from station to seafront is welcoming, safe, and exciting."

"Promote the parks and nature areas. Promote walking routes in the locality. Emphasise the historical aspects of the area." "Protect the architectural heritage and add some 'cool' to the seafront."

"Cut traffic along sea front apart from access. Reduce car parking for residents all year to encourage use of local shops, make rates cheaper for small pop-up business to fill vacant retail, making park and ride more frequent and cheaper. Improve seafront lighting. Use and display Weymouth's fascinating history more. Make it a year-round destination by encouraging music culture events, seafood events, sports events. Play down the tacky fair side which discourages locals from coming into town. Establish a weekly proper market, like Dorchester, which is always busy, with reduced parking charges. People would stay to shop in town and take refreshments too. Planting and pedestrian walkways are good but could be improved. Greenhill Gardens is fab but could be extended along sea front, i.e. green up the area into a park like zone."



"Reduce the height of some funfair (rides) so the whole length of historic sea front buildings is visible. More attractive cafés with tasteful outside spaces...Updated tide times on a large board. More toilets. More information kiosks. Map at entrance to (town centre) main streets with all the shops named so people know where to go. Clear signage for Jurassic Coast."

"Make more of the traditional buildings, remove lasers and make it generally classier to appeal to a wider range of visitors."

"Something needs to happen at the Pavilion, it could be an amazing space! Lots of eateries, a bar etc. Bike parking would be great. Some more things in-between the (Greenhill) rocks and the Oasis, it's very bare there and not very busy, especially as there is a huge car park at Lodmoor."

"More play areas, swim kit lockers up at Greenhill, swim challenges in the bay, more water sport shops, more diverse choice of places to eat."

"Additional access from prom to beach for visitors with mobility issues, play areas on beach like in European countries, more evening dining on prom to boost hospitality, specific cycle path area like in Brighton."

"Remove cars, if you look at the most successful seaside towns the priority is given to pedestrians and activities. In Weymouth cars and traffic take up most of the space meaning a lack of activities."

"Provide a safe, continuous cycle route so we don't have to negotiate the St John's Church roundabout. Provide manned cycle storage - look at the Dutch models. Many of us have bikes worth more than our cars and won't cycle to Weymouth as a chained bike is not secure. Reinstate a changing facility and lockers for all year-round sea swimmers. Maintain the Victorian beach huts - the ones with the iron work as they are a feature of Weymouth. Although there is seating in shelters along the seafront, there could be a seating arrangement, sheltered from the wind with Perspex shields, that encourages conversation and activities for older people e.g. boules. Encourage use of the paddling pool and sand pit by the beach huts at the Groynes and bring them into use more often. Make the view from the road from Cafe Oasis to the Groynes more interesting on the seaward side i.e., do something with the steep bank up the sea."

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"Make water sports more accessible with places where you can rent equipment for example paddle boards."

> "Plant trees for biodiversity and shade. Pedestrianise the main street. Create more cycle only areas."

"Hold a wide range of events for all age groups to bring people from all over, iron-man and motocross are good examples of how-to bring people that would stay here and spend their money etc. There is so much possibility for stages on the beach again for bands etc. Quayside on the harbour is always extremely busy, can easily make similar money with something along the seafront...Utilise railings along the seafront to promote these events. Poster drums are outdated. Events such as silent discos would be a fab idea and could utilise local Weymouth DJs (there are quite a few). The young people will pave the way for the future economy of Weymouth so it's worth keeping them engaged. Weymouth is already seen as a prime spot for new years in the UK for a night out so could expand on this! Creative/ art pop ups such as pottery (pots and pints is a growing event in Weymouth held at the belvedere which is wildly popular). Create an outside structure to hold such events rather than using little gazebos etc.- perhaps in a similar style to the dome for the sandman. More culture and events!"



"Outdoor gym on beach, add more benches to sea front and bring back the fairy lights! Entertainment/live bands on beach. Better promotion and marketing of events."

"There needs to be an events team. It needs to be made easier or even incentivised for professional attractions, businesses, groups, clubs, organisations, artists to put things on, have stands and stalls, exhibits, create attractions, give demonstrations etc.. I heard that someone wanted to create a SUP business hiring paddleboards out but wasn't allowed because of competition to the pedalo business - surely, we need to think about having more choice not a monopoly. We need to attract events and businesses in from out of the area - outdoor cinemas, music gatherings (DJ's, bands, then also jives and dances for older people)."

"I would like to reinstate the pier, keep the Georgian/Victorian aspect in the main seafront area, water sports could be added to the Preston beach wall area if it doesn't interfere with the wildlife on Lodmoor, smarten up the Greenhill chalet area while still keeping the chalets as they are mainly used by the locals."

"More garden areas, more gyms for physical health, better design of the promenade, street markets, and more community events on the beach."

"Create a welcoming atmosphere with music and a sense of fun. Have events that draw people to Weymouth. Create opportunity on the beach for designated cafe style areas for people to sit, relax and enjoy coffee rather than just takeaway. Love what has been done to the harbour."

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"I would plant trees...lots of them! It will improve the aesthetics of the sea front and give shade for people to sit. I would create a lovely welcoming social space

"Have an hour free parking in long stay car parks. Improve the pavement and sign posting from car parks to seafront. Add more waste bins and collect them more often. Improve toilet facilities to 2022 standards."


"Stop traffic from Pier **Bandstand to the Pavilion** - buses only."

"Reinstate the pier, this would be a wonderful asset to have back. Fill it with restaurants and not arcade shops. Give the locals something to do in the Winter months, I.e., skating rink, bowling alley, indoor splashback etc.. I think the latter should really be considered for the Pavilion development."

"Take away parking on the actual seafront and move to car parks only. Increase pedestrian crossings. More toilets. A stage area for live music to be held all through the summer. Wheelchair access all the way to the water edge. A proper cycle path to be used all year round. More events."

"Reduce car journeys along seafront. Pedestrianise King Street so that access from station to seafront is welcoming, safe, and exciting."

"Make it more interesting add a variety of things (to do) not just the traditional funfair stuff on and off the beach...More beach activities, sports, parkour area for boys and girls of all ages, spaces for them like the skate park by Sealife. Remove one of the funfair areas and make it a splash park and eco area for all with greenery and seating. Look to make it an eco-beach... Show how rubbish effects the beach and how it can be transformed into other things."



"Improve promenade - make it flat (re-surface) and cleaner. Better seating options whilst retaining character of Georgian seafront and shelters. Ensure motorised transport is not mixed with pedestrians (except disabled). Upgrade existing water sport facilities on main part of beach - better pedalo, kayak and possibly paddle boards for hire. Better cafe options offering more than burgers - maybe seafood pop ups for the summer to showcase local produce."

"Not have quite so many fairground style rides on the beach. Water sports hire. Improve area under the tennis courts at Greenhill the old beach cabins look an eye sore and path needs widening. Have the land train run from Overcombe Corner all the way to the Nothe. Another shower/toilet area (like the new ones by the information centre) at the Pavilion end of the sea front."

"Limit traffic along the esplanade from Kings statue to the Pavilion. Encourage use of park and ride. Put showers on the beach for swimmers."

"Pedestrianise as much as possible and have gardens along the esplanade. Have evening live music events on the beach. Let bars and cafés have tables nearer the beach to make the most of the view. Emphasise local seafood and produce."

"Sports both ends not just pavilion side. Encourage schools to use the beach safely during term time. Shaded areas that can be removed in winter. Affordable water sports teens would enjoy. More sports for teens to use (football/volleyball). More events that children can enjoy during the cooler months." "Tidy up the railings and seating areas but still make them in keeping with their Victoriana style. Pay homage in some way to the towns Georgian influence. Improve the toilet facilities, create public spaces for eating e.g. picnic tables. Put on events to draw crowds and make use of the open space on the beach front. Improve the water sport facilities maybe having several 'hubs' along the entire stretch of beach from pavilion to Overcombe instead of mainly just at the pavilion end. It seems that a lot of the resources are focused towards the pavilion end of the beach and then thinning out towards Overcombe. It would be nice to see the Lodmoor nature reserve incorporated into the Overcombe end of the beach in some way, with natural seating areas and flower arrangements."

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"More activities for younger people - music events on the beach, theatre shows on the beach, sports activities." "Remove as many poles/clutter as possible."

"Sauna on the beach; more storage i.e. lockers; designated picnic areas with shelter; easily accessible water sports hire."

"Need to work with hotels and B&B owners to help them invest in improving the quality of accommodation. Better cycle routes. Minimise the dominance of cars. Public events. Involve local people in planning. Maybe widen access to water sports opportunities. Better play park for kids."

"Events that bring people of all ages together. More beach huts. Perhaps stalls in the summer. More toilet facilities."

"Get rid of the cars along the front. More coffee and light food places along the beach with seating. Also stay open later (it's cold and in the shade on the other side of the road)." "I'd introduce art on the beaches like they have in Aldeburgh - tasteful and local as Weymouth has great art heritage. Also, independent food and drink places - not bad bars to get pissed, but restaurants to drink a local wine and eat seafood. I'd encourage music and places to sit and watch it. I'd have less cars and more pedestrian space on the seafront so it's more tranquil. And I'd have it look traditional with a modern twist - classic white lights and ornate benches (not the lasers!). I'd create a cafe culture supporting local business, art, history, the sea, and sailing. I'd encourage east hubs and local businesses on smaller streets and Brewers Quay so people have a reason to visit - think Frome, Stroud, Brighton."

The webinar was attended by over 130 local residents and businesses owners.


Weymouth Seafront Masterplan

Weymouth is a great coastal resort, with a great beach. The Which Review gave Weymouth 5* for both its beach and seafront, whilst the Rough Guide stated that "It's worth a visit for the fine sandy beach alone". But surveys suggest that for holiday makers, a great beach is no longer enough. They are looking for places with 'authenticity', places which demonstrate their heritage, nature, culture, and wider sustainability. The public survey, completed by 2224 people, highlights that this is also what residents of Weymouth want from their seafront. Fortunately, Weymouth seafront's royal heritage, together with its proximity to the harbour, historic town centre, marina, nature reserves and other attractions means it is well placed to benefit from these trends.

The draft masterplan report considers ways in which Weymouth seafront can make the best possible use of these assets, to attract visitors, upport local businesses and provide the best possible social and leisure facilities for local resident

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Weymouth Seafront Masterplan Public Webinar Comments/Questions

I love ALL the ideas in this report - progressive and with great out-of-the-box thinking. However, I also completely agree with the report that it would be 'impossible and counterproductive to consider the seafront in isolation? Given that we have an outdated town centre master plan, a Neighbourhood Plan in development, flood defence plans and other stakeholders (particularly Dorset Council) have various plans for our town. Can the leader of the town council comment on how these various plans will be drawn together coherently to the maximum benefit of Weymouth residents whose thoughts are so well captured and translated in this report?

Greenhill Gardens - our problem is that pop up markets etc and community garden will detract from what is already an award-winning garden. A pop-up cafe is not necessary as there are two cafés here within a short walk of each other, a better option would be renovating the Jurassic Rocks Cafe building and to extend the existing cafe and upgrade the food they serve.

Your proposals seem very well thought out.

I love the idea of moving parking away from the seafront. Do you foresee a need to add parking else-where to compensate?

The natural section of beach, east of the rock groyne, is lovely for experienced swimmers, but probably not so appealing for families, with a pebbly beach and more sharply shelving water. Some showers/ changing facilities there, for the open water swimmers who use that section a lot, would be great

Reduced traffic and on street parking would definitely be an improvement both visually and road safety wise. Especially appealing if it allows for more external seating for the restaurants and greater safety for pedestrianisation traffic. While considering moving the newer fairground attractions to the front of the Pavilion may seem a good idea, such 'attractions' tend to be unsightly and would adversely affect the appearance of the front of the Pavilion. It may be that while these attractions are based on the beach, they attract more custom by being in this location as opposed to a more remote setting.

Park and ride would be excellent particularly if cars are removed from the seafront and would create jobs and support ecological targets and the impact of pollution on the environment and population.

If your brief had gone slightly further to the peninsular, would you have changed any of your proposals (which are positive)

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I like the ideas; would also like to see encouragement given to 4and 5-star hotels. Would it also be possible to extend the sandy beach?

Good work - well done. What is the delivery mechanism, who's paying?

> I don't have any questions, but it all sounds great to me.

You mentioned some amazing ideas. However as a Guesthouse owner & resident. I heard a lot about losing parking. as we are near the harbour with the development in the harbour, we have lost so much parking already.

I like the stepped seating by the clock. Do you think this can engineered to maintain storm surge protection? (It was previously suggested for the Pavilion/Ali Gardens end)


Interested that Tennis courts to be reduced, but Bowls untouched. Experience in Dorchester was that the Bowls club was less used, and tennis improved in its place. Bournemouth club also closed. In Poole Park, the tennis courts are heavily used, the bowls club has few members. Perhaps updating the tennis courts would encourage more use. The Tennis Coach in Poole is concerned that Tennis is becoming less accessible to all.

Might the tennis courts be moved to Radipole Park?

You spoke at the start of your speech that you wanted facilities for locals and visitors. How can building more cafés, which we don't need and more seating give any facilities. They don't. Frankly, we are not interested in "biodiversity, sustainability " in what is an urban environment. We are interested in enhancing the space we have in a usable and sympathetic way. If you want biodiversity, you have Lodmoor to work with and Radipole Lake to work with. Treat the urban environment like an urban environment. Buzz words and terminology won't do that.

Why is it necessary to build a signature cafe here and how can an unnecessary building be considered "sustainable". Surely a better option would be to put your signature cafe where AI Molo is and do some extending work (balcony) on what is already a feature building.

These proposals are really thinking outside the box and genuinely exciting. If they are to ever be a reality, how will they be funded please?
